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Rizzoli published a monograph, or comprehensive art book, on Yoo Youngkuk (1916-2002), a leading figure in the so-called first generation of Korean abstract art, last week. It is the first time that the famous New York-based bookstore and publisher specializing in art and design published a monograph of a Korean artist, according to Kukje Gallery, which represents the artist in the global art market.

The English-language book titled "Yoo Youngkuk: Quintessence" shows "a broad spectrum of works including both widely recognized, seminal masterpieces and never-before-seen works," the galley said.

Consistently throughout his life, Yoo studied and created abstract art based on nature — especially the mountains in Uljin County, where he was born. He once said in a note that, "The subject of my oeuvre is nature, which I have explored through non-figurative forms. That is abstraction. It is nature, not as a particular subject, but as lines, planes and colors."

The authors include Rosa Maria Falvo, an independent writer and curator based in Milan; Gabriel Ritter, head of contemporary art at the Minneapolis Institute of Art; Kim In-hye, a curator at the National Museum of Modern and Contemporary Art (MMCA) who organized the seminal retrospective of Yoo in 2016; and Bartomeu Marí, the former director of the MMCA and current executive director of the Museo de Arte de Lima in Peru.
