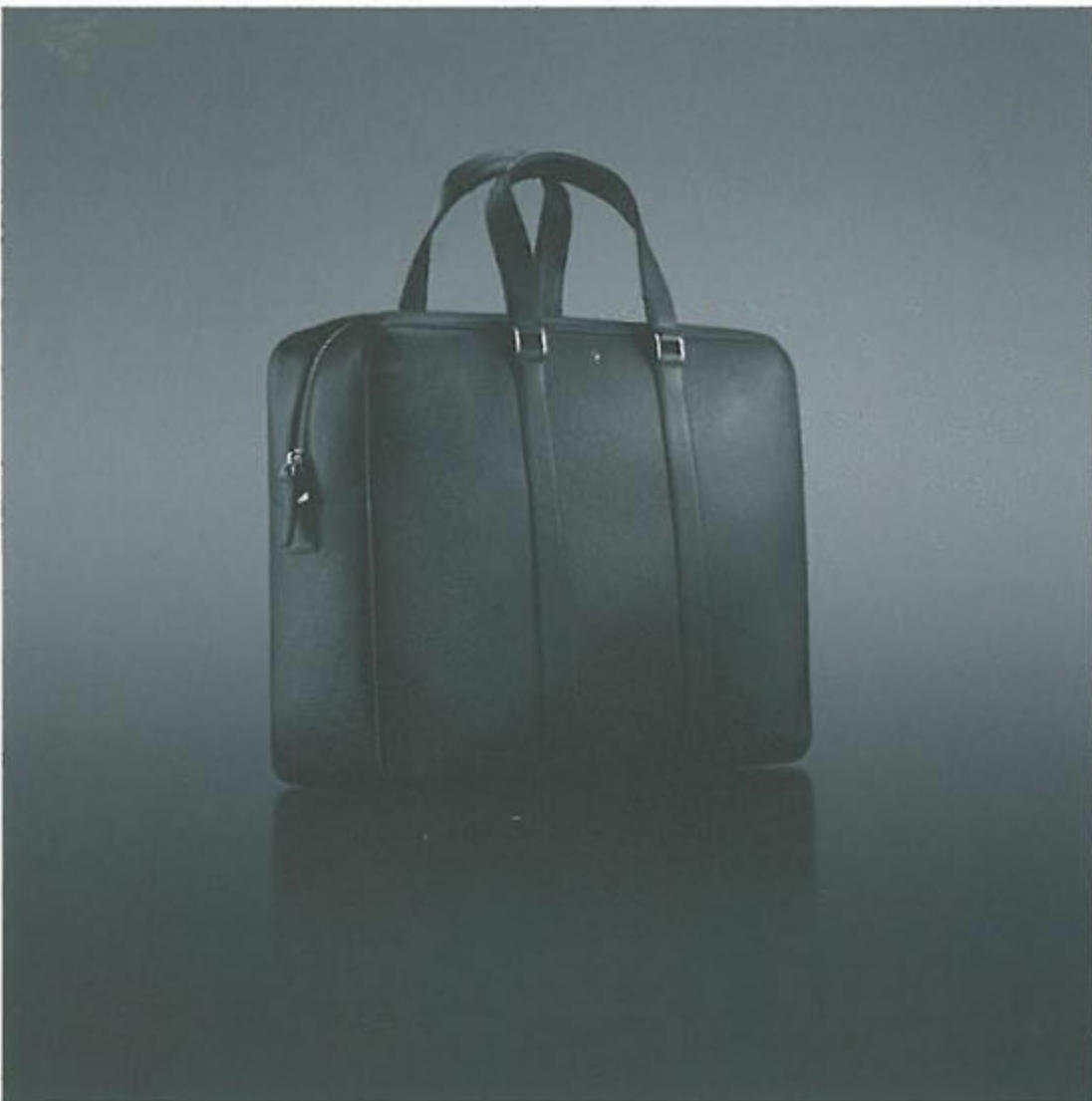

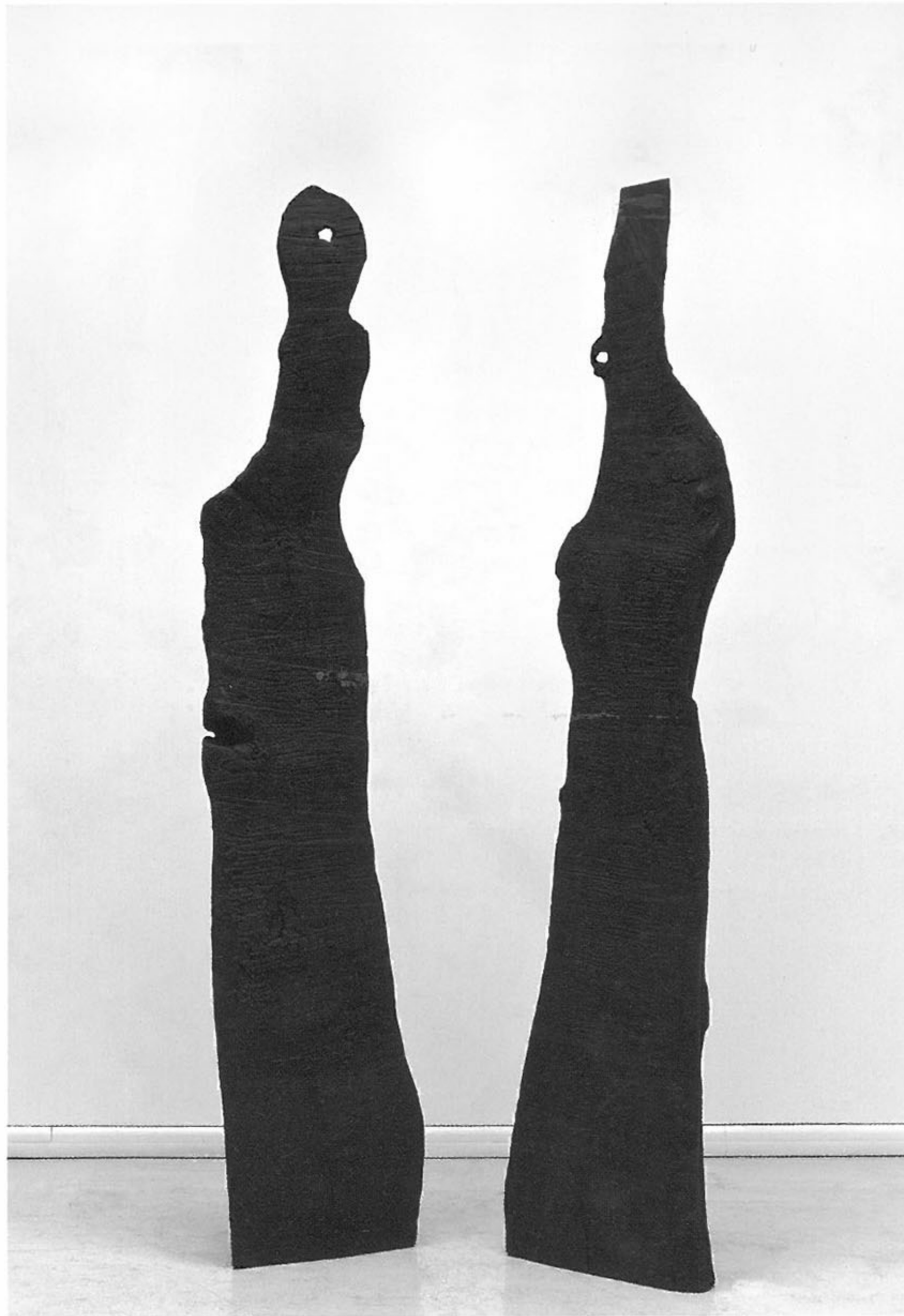

David Nash is widely celebrated for his ethical approach to nature and the exquisitely beautiful objects he shapes from wood found in the wild. To fully appreciate the rough-hewn and lyrical sculptures wrought by Nash, it is essential to understand how the artist views trees and the role of ecology in his practice. Since the beginning of his prolific career, Nash has been committed to making artworks in concert with his chosen material, using only trees that have fallen naturally due to weather or disease.
